One way is to do it on the cheap, cut back on some of the items that need to be done and try to get the cost down to what is available. This method has lead us to the state we are in now where the deferred maintenance is so expensive because some of the previous construction was done by methods often not up to professional standards. This is evidenced by the problem with the carpeting in the dinning room; it was improperly installed and glued to the subfloor. There is an area of the floor that sags in front of the serving window that was not properly addressed. The drain from the coffee machine sink goes up-hill in one section causing regular backups. Another way, is to do what needs to be done in a proper manner with local, licensed, bonded and insured contractors which may cost more up front but will cost less long term.

To pay for the unfunded portion of the project we can vote on an assessment where each member who holds a certificate of membership; regular, inactive or lifetime, puts in a one time amount of money to equal proportional share of the cost of the short age. We currently estimate this to be approximately \$500.00

Another way is to finance the difference using a commercial loan based on our 20 year lease of the building. This would cost more but could be spread over time and paid back with an increase in dues. We may want to reserve this option because we have not yet found out what will happen in regards to the elevator for the building. Vintage has submitted the plans to Oxnard Building and Safety without an elevator. If they are approved then we will have to contribute some or all of the cost of the elevator if we want it. If we do, that is when we may want to investigate the financing option.



Hello Boaters and Waterfront Lovers,

WEATHER:

Our on shore weather continues to be unseasonably warm. Offshore Northwesterly winds are still keeping most boaters close to shore.

Saturday, April 12 we had a fairly strong Santa Ana wind storm bringing 25 to 30 knots of wind. This was the latest full northeaster I can ever remember. Generally when you get 10 to 15 knots offshore winds this time of year they are back wind created by gale force northwest offshore winds coming over the high coastal mountain ranges dropping low level amounts of wind down coastal canyons.

Keep a close watch on the weather every trip out avoiding any predicted conditions with 15+ knot winds. Add 5 to 6 foot swells and west current into these swells results in very uncomfortable boating.

FISHING:

My nephew Steve Bostack from Santa Barbara and I have been fishing the surf for perch this past month with fair results. This is a good activity during rough weather months offshore. We simply look at the local tide charts for our area and try to fish when the tide one hour before high tide through high tide for a total of about 2 hours fishing time.

We try fish waters from the curl of the wave to about a foot deep of white water. The perch feed in this zone on sea worms, sand crabs, and small bait fish.

I prefer to use light tackle similar to what one would use to fish trout in fresh water. Simply take a spinning outfit with 4 pound test line and put line through guides leaving about 6 feet of line off the tip. Next tie a #6 brown bait hook to the bitter end. Cut the main line 3 feet up and slid a 1/2 ounce sliding sinker up the main line first followed by a plastic florescent bead. Tie the main line holding the bead and sinker to a small swivel. The swivel stops the bead and sinker from sliding all the way to the hook. Now take the 3 foot piece of mono line with the hook tied to end and take the opposite end and tie onto the remaining end of swivel holding the bead and sinker. (bead and sinker are on the line attached to the rod).

Next are the baits. I prefer to use artificial grub baits. These baits are durable and most tackle store carry a wide variety. I prefer the root beer color and the motor oil color they seem to get more bites.

As for the live baits, sand crab work well. to catch the one simple take a flat nosed shovel and simple dig up a shovel full of sand and power spread it out across the hard sand beach and watch for 1/4-1/2" bugs that look more like a sow bug than a crab. Have a bucket with a little sand and water to hold them while you catch and fish with them?

The other bait, which I have never tried are Chinese worms. They come in 1-3 foot lengths and cut into 1' pieces. Hook the pieces on close to the end of the piece so the bait will wave instead of spin in circles if you hook in middle of piece.

All beaches have surf perch. This time of year you may catch a Corbina which run a pound to five pounds in size. Be sure your drag is set light. My nephew fought a nice fish in the surf for over 20 minutes only to pull the hook because he readjusted his drag setting too high. This is called farming a fish.

Take the whole family surf fishing you have a great time even if you do not catch a fish.

BOATS:

This past weekend was the Newport Boat Show and while walking the show with clients I could not resist doing the old time stability test on most all the new and newer yachts. Quite frankly, they all failed. I simply step on the corner of the swim platform or corner of the cockpit and see how many degrees of motion I create with my personal weight.

I do this to each new model. In my opinion the stability of many yachts are closing in on being at a dangerous level. If you are looking at any boat 55 foot and under start with this test. If the boat heals at dock-side with your weight, imagine how much motion it will generate with 5 foot seas and 20 knots of wind. If you are working with a yacht broker, ask that he perform this test for you. If he does not know what you are proposing, find another broker. Hopefully manufactures will move towards more seaworthiness of their products rather just glitz.

In the 18 mile non spinnaker class, the consummate Velero managed to beat Dennis West on West Wing and Zuma Jay and Outpatient also of CIYC brought up the rear.

In the 22 mile spinnaker class Harry Krum on Fusee just managed to pip School's Out from PCYC by 3 seconds, who just managed to beat Colt 45 by another three seconds. That is close racing guys! Our Funatic was a creditable 4th, considering the work Rod and Roxanne have to put in just to hoist sails.

This was an awesome performance for CIYC boats with 4 out of 5 boats in non spin and 3 out of 7 boats in the

spinnaker class. We took both first places!

In Spinnaker A, Alex Bankfield on *Deception* managed to reel in the whole of his class, coming from behind to win over the ever present *Rival* and *Colt 45* coming in 3rd. Our *Funatic* was 5th with Mike Taylor on *Maine Squeeze*, still looking for that win, coming in 7th.

In Spin B there were two hard fought contects. Kevin Dickmann's *Zuma Jay* just failed to hold off *Rambunctious* for 4th place while at the top of the class, *Perfect Balance* held the lead for 9 miles, but *Blue Star* capitalized on a mistake by Sharpe just before the first rig and then began a procession with these two boats no more than 100 yards apart for the next 10 miles. *Blue Star* ended the day in first place 1 minute and 9 seconds ahead.

In the Cruising Handicap class, our own *West Wing* managed to overtake the Hunter, *Quiet Times* just before the breakwater to finish up a well deserved winner.

It was business as usual in the non spin class as *Velero*, sailed by CIYC's Brent Swanson held the other 3 boats at bay and finished 8 minutes 9 seconds ahead.

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



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
