Third Classical Guitar Recital at CIYC Tuesday, May 26, 7:00PM (club opens at 6:00PM)



Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease COPD Overview

COPD, or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, is a long-term lung disease that refers to both chronic bronchitis and emphysema. COPD symptoms include persistent cough with mucus shortness of breath and tightening sensation in your chest.

COPD is most often caused by smoking. Most people with COPD are long-term smokers, and research shows that smoking cigarettes increases the risk of getting COPD.

Long-term exposure to other lung irritants also is a risk factor for COPD. Examples of other lung irritants include secondhand smoke, air pollution, and chemical fumes and dust from the environment or workplace.

Most people who have COPD are at least 40 years old when symptoms begin. Although uncommon, people younger than 40 can have COPD.

COPD can be a mixture of two diseases: chronic bronchitis and emphysema. Both of these diseases greater the chance of COPD caused by smoking. Even though you can have either chronic bronchitis or emphysema, people frequently have a mixture of both diseases.

Possible treatments for COPD can include, quitting smoking and avoiding triggers, such as air pollution. Limit your symptoms, such as shortness of breath, with medicines.

Increase your overall health with regular activity. Prevent and treat flare-ups with medicines and other treatment.





Enrollment is by e-mail and you must contact the instructor, who will send you the study questions to be completed before class.





Doc Lines

LORD OF THE FLIES

True flies have only one pair of wings. I've always wondered how a fly, flapping its wings, and with its feet down, can flip upside down to land, feet up, on the ceiling.

House Fly (Musca domestica) accounts for 90% of flies in human habitations. They live between 14 and 30 days. In a lifetime females lay some 500 eggs. These are deposited in decaying organic materials (including the unmentionable one), from which, within a day or so, maggots emerge. Within a day and a half the female is receptive for dating. Flies can transmit some 100 diseases to humans. These include typhoid, cholera, salmonellosis, dysentery, and even parasitic worms. They do that by puking (to dissolve solid food), pooping, and trampling our food with their little contaminated feet. UGGHH!

Kelp Fly (Coelopidae) lives in the wrack zone. Wrack zone? That's part of the shore just above the mean high tide line where clumps of kelp and other seaweeds are stranded. These flies are of interest to fishermen and mariners, because: a) surf fish feed on eggs and larvae washed out of stranded kelp at high tide, and b) whenever the wind dies they appear on boats and annoy the hell out of the already frustrated, becalmed sailors. A good flyswatter should be on any well-appointed boat and count towards CIYC's Bristol Boat Award.

Bar Fly (Dorsophilia melanogaster) is a type of fruit fly that hangs around bars. This is because this 3mm-long insect loves moist, sticky areas and objects such as beer taps, drains, and wet mops. It also likes sweet liquors such as Kahlua, Cointreau, and Vermouth (who knew?). These small flies live only 48 hours. The trick is to keep the bar area clean and dry after hours, and to remove wet mops from the bar area. Lucky for us, we have meticulous bartenders, obsessed with cleanliness, so we have no bar fly problem. The other subspecies of bar fly are the humans who frequent bars and cannot be pried away.

Horse Flies (family Tabanidae) are real pests. Especially females. Females require a blood meal before they can reproduce. They only live for a few days and are desperate to mate. This means dinner first, then sex. Thus, they go nuts and bite livestock and humans. No wonder horses have tails to whack them. Horses are also able to twitch their skin muscles rapidly to shake them off. Humans just have to slap them silly, but these insects are very fast and maneuverable, capable of aerial acrobatics similar to jets (Immelman turn). Also, they are not easily deterred and will persist in attacking until they get a piece of flesh or are killed. These flies can transmit tularemia and some filarial worms in humans, and anthrax in animals. Although some horse flies contribute to pollination, basically the only good fly is a dead fly (except, of course, for the subspecies of human bar flies).
