

## The Competitive Edge

#### The Racing Season Winds Down for CIYC

With the Richard Nix Memorial Platform Race on September 15th, the season of CIYC sponsored races ended. We now have just a few races left on the calendar, including the Ventura Cup and Fall Series to go, before the tired racers get a few weeks off to repair their equipment and attend to their bruises.

It has been a long hard year for most and the "off season" time between the beginning of December and the middle of January will be a welcome respite. Many of our boats, *Funatic* (Rod Abbott), *Sisu* (Tim Haapanen), *Harmony (Mike Taylor)*, *Velero (Brent Swanson)*, *Zuma Jay* (Kevin Dickmann) and *Perfect Balance (Richard Sharpe)*, to name but a few, have been flying the CIYC burgee at scores of races up and down the Santa Barbara Channel this year. Our thanks go to them and the valiant team of race organizers, run by Sue Johnston. Without racers and race committee, there is no racing.

#### **Regatta Racing**

The regatta type of course has been losing it's appeal of late with sailors from many yacht clubs, and the reasons are difficult to understand. One is that many more racers are choosing different and larger types of boats that do not excel at this type of course and as they are not racing against the exact same boat, it is difficult to judge their performance. The second reason is that Windward Leeward racing is challenging in terms of crew coordination. Many people shy (needlessly) away from it.

Maybe it is time for the Association of Santa Barbara Yacht Clubs to get together to foster one design racing, by sponsoring a small range of classes where sailors can depend on getting stiff competition, a forum for self improvement and passing on knowledge, as well as a ready market for their boat when they wish to move up a class. Then perhaps we will have more participation in Windward Leeward type racing. Active fleets tend to attract others to join in and match up against each other. One design racing and windward leeward racing go hand in hand with vastly improving your race course skills.

#### **Neil Underwood Regatta**

This year's CIYC regatta saw three J24 (not one from CIYC), three PHRF A boats and three PHRF B boats take part in 4 races.



Taking honors in the J24 fleet was *Tortoise* (Stan Weisenhunt), the guy who writes about sailing in the Ventura County Star on Thursday's, having a long awaited win over *Commotion* and *Angry Hill-billies*.

In the PHRF fleet *Bikini Machine* had it all her own way with 4 wins, while Richard Sharpe in *Perfect Balance* had a day he would like to forget with an "over early" at the start in the first race, and could only manage an overall second place. *Superluminal*, the Flying Tiger, had to settle for third.

In PHRF B Velero, Sisu and Zuma Jay all raced hard and finish each race on the same order.



The Tragedy is that the racing was close (closer than it looks), the races were well run, the crews all had a great day, CIYC entertained everyone well (as usual) but few came out to participate.



#### **Prison Break**

Next on the calendar with participation from CIYC was the Ventura Sailing Club Prison Break. This novel format starts with all boats at anchor and all sails on the deck, anchored in Prisoners Harbor, Santa Cruz Island. When the starting gun goes, you may do anything except start your engine, in order to reach the wind line. The course is then straight to Ventura harbor. Our own Bill Brayton with *On Porpoise*, sailed heroically to 6<sup>th</sup> place (out of seven) but his comment "a wonderful day on the water" was true for all participants. No points at stake, no ego at stake, just people enjoying themselves.

#### **Richard Nix Memorial Platform Race**

The inaugural race was supported by four boats from CIYC, but only one outsider.

The course from Mandalay buoy to Gilda oil platform and back to the harbor was challenging, especially for the smaller boats who had to contend with a fog bank and reduced wind. In the luck of the draw, the boats finished in order of waterline length. First home and taking the very well appointed cup (presented by the widow of Richard Nix, our own commodore Colleen Nix) was Rod Abbott's *Funatic*, closely followed by the new Flying Tiger Ruckus Eric Schlateger AYC (of which I am sure we will hear more) then *Perfect Balance* (Richard Sharpe), *Harmony* (Mike Taylor) and *Sisu* (Tim Haapanen)

For next year's calendar, it is hoped that the number of races will be reduced to allow larger fleets to participate and perhaps some amalgamation of races should be considered. It is one of the longest seasons in the nation with most weekends filled with important races. For those of us who have to work, it is a problem getting time to work on the boat.

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

## Anglers' Corner

The *Valkyrie* was down for a transmission rebuild. I had hoped to fish the CI Invitational Billfish Tourney this year, but it didn't look like it was going to happen. Then, I got a call from Larry Bensel to say he had room for a crew member on the *Pacific Player*. He didn't have to ask twice.

I came aboard Saturday morning, September 8th, at 4:30AM with Dick Olsen, Bob Deyling and Larry Bensel. We were underway at 5AM for a quick ride to Avalon. I say quick because the *Valkyrie* cruises at about 10 knots compared to *Pacific Player's* 20kt+cruise.

First day of fishing wasn't too bad and I got to spot a sleeper Marlin while on the helm. Matter of fact, I almost ran over it. Did I mention cataracts? That fish stayed on the surface for at least 25 minutes, while we dragged lures by him and threw live bait at him—but he was having nothing to do with it. He finally sunk out as we continued on.

The seas continued to build and the ride back uphill to Avalon from the south was getting uncomfortable. From that night until we got home, Thursday afternoon, the seas just kept getting worse, making it hard to sight fish and the lures wouldn't run right. We had a South swell mixed with a West swell and a North/West wind wave that provided confused seas running 3-5 feet and 5 second intervals.

Out of 5 days fishing for 21 boats, only 5 Marlin were caught and released. First place was taken by *Reel Change* with 3 fish, second place was *Wild Thing* with one fish, and

third was taken by Ruckus with one fish.

It was still a great trip with lots of fun and camaraderie. Thanks, Larry, for having me aboard!

Both the Kick Off Dinner on the Friday before the Tournament, and the Awards Dinner after the tournament, held at our club, where fabulous affairs with great food and tons of raffle prizes. The Islander out did themselves setting up, cooking and serving thank you very much.



#### Don't "Snub" Your Nose at This ...

It was a gorgeous Friday afternoon in October. Ten boats were anchored in Smugglers Cove, Santa Cruz Island. Times were good. All hands enjoyed a sunny afternoon of visiting one another's boats, sharing drinks and good food, having not a care in the world.

By 1800, however, the sky to the southeast started to darken and a gentle wind began to blow in from the open ocean pushing a small ripple. I started to suspect something was going to happen, but it was already getting dark and, because I was alone on my boat, moving, under the circumstances, was going to be more difficult. So, I went forward and released additional scope. Having 250 feet of chain and a "Snubber" out front while anchored in 30 feet of water would allow me to sleep well regardless of the un-forecast conditions. If you spend enough nights at the islands as we have, you know how important it is to be prepared for anything to come up in the night.

By 2300, the wind was blowing in at 35 knots pushing 4 to 5 foot swells directly into Smugglers. All boats were "taking it on the chin." We all had our radios turned on and were monitoring a common channel; keeping in touch with one another hourly for status reports and to render assistance (to the extent possible) if necessary. At 0220, a call came in from "John" who said his windlass had just been torn off its platform, and asking if I had any ideas? Initially, it occurred to me that, John had taken my Seamanship Course offered by the Ventura Power Squadron, and that, he knew better than to skip using a "Snubber". Then I thought of the big bolts holding his windlass to the boat and how they sheared off under the pressure of the incoming swells and wind. Then, knowing not what else to say, and confident that his boat was not dragging anchor, I simply told him to lash it to a cleat and go back to sleep as there was nothing, he, I, or God could do to help him at that moment.


When the wind subsided in the morning, John and his wife and the rest of their crew were faced with pulling their anchor by hand. Unfortunately, they could not get it out and thus ended up leaving it behind. They went home short a couple hundred feet of chain. The lesson in all this? Always use a "Snubber" when anchored.

An anchor "Snubber" is a bridle used to take the strain of the chain rode. This reduces wear on your boat from the chain and also acts as a shock absorber and silences the chain.

Using 3-strand nylon line, splice 2 eye loops to go around your port and starboard bow cleats. Splice these two lines together a distance about equal to the height of the bow above the water. The diameter of the line depends on the size of your boat.


When in doubt, always size-up for the line. Splice these two lines together a distance about equal to the height of the bow above the water.

Next, splice a stainless steel thimble to the end. The total length should be 2 to 3 times the height of the bow above the water. Finally, use a stainless steel shackle to attach a stainless steel grab hook to the end. Size the grab hook to your chain size.



Using the "Snubber" is easy and only takes a few minutes to set up. Use a 1/2" line (about 15 feet) and attach to the eye of the "Snubber". When your anchor is set, simply place a link of chain in the "u" section, let out enough chain to position the "Snubber" about 1/2 the distance between the anchor roller and the water, tension the "Snubber" line at the cleat. This will put a little slack in the chain and act as shock absorber. Removing the "Snubber" is accomplished by pulling the rode (with the "Snubber" in place) to the anchor roller, then use a boat hook to grab the eye of the "Snubber" to release the chain.

The "Snubber" was designed to give a little flexibility to your all-chain anchor rode.



very little elasticity, the "Snubber" will prevent a "bar tight" condition when high winds and severe conditions are encountered. The "Snubber" also will allow you to anchor and not have that little jerk when the wind changes direction. This is not only annoying but also wears on the windless.

When anchoring, please be reminded that your windlass (no matter which one you own) is not made to withstand the load of your ground tackle. If you are using an all line anchor rode it is very easy to make your line off on a bow cleat after anchoring, but if you are using an all chain rode, a "Snubber" should be used in an effort to take up the shock load of the chain. Chain does not stretch but the nylon line used for a "Snubber" will. Using a "Snubber" properly prevents transferring shock load from the chain to your windlass and boat. Boats that do not use "Snubber"s will more than likely have Windlass failures or worse, break loose when experiencing heavy winds and wave action.

Few know this better than old John.

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
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


