I have had the opportunity to visit many yacht clubs across the country and gotten a glimpse of clubs large and small, old and new, but I have not seen many clubs in other countries. On my recent trip to Ireland I stumbled upon the "Royal Irish Yacht Club." I say "stumbled upon" because Art and I were walking through the Dun Laoghaire Harbor in Ireland and got to chatting with an expat American named Joe, walking to work. Turns out, he worked at the Royal Irish Yacht Club! Joe invited us into the club and let us in on a bit of the club's history.



The Royal Irish Yacht Club was founded in 1831 and Henry Paget, 1st Marquess of Anglesey, was the first Commodore of the club. He was second in command to the Duke of Wellington at the Battle of Waterloo. The current clubhouse was



designed by John Skipton Mulvany, a noted Irish Architect, in 1851. As with most of Mulvany's buildings, the clubhouse has been well preserved and retains many period architectural details.

The club's original charter includes a unique provision that all yacht owner members must provide the Commodore with information about the coasts they sail along and any deep-sea fishing spots they encounter on their voyages. The Commodore could then use this information to inform the Admiralty for map-making purposes and places to send fishing fleets.

At the time of the founding of the club in 1831, the club was granted a white ensign to designate boats associated with the club. The ensign did feature the Coat of Arms of the Kingdom of Ireland beneath the Union Jack (The Coat of Arms is now beneath the flag of the Republic of Ireland).

In 1846, the club was granted the right to the "Royal" prefix by Queen Victoria, and despite the separation of Ireland from the United Kingdom, the Irish Yacht Club elected to retain the Royal prefix as the Royal Irish Yacht Club.



In 1848, Queen Victoria created a yachting trophy called "Her Majesty's Plate," and it was decided that the Royal Irish Yacht Club and the Royal St. George Yacht Club should compete for the honor of the trophy each year, a tradition that holds today.

Spending the afternoon in the club's plush chairs, surrounded by the rich burgundy walls and deep soft carpets of the Mulvany-designed clubhouse, made it easy to see why Joe pulled up stakes from the US to live in Ireland and surround himself with the history of the Royal Irish Yacht Club. It made me feel excited about continuing to visit clubs around the world and meet with like-minded hobbyists and enthusiasts for fair winds and following seas.





The God Who Ate His Children

Cronos is his name. Chronos, Kronos or Cronus, was a deity in ancient Greek mythology. He was a powerful Titan who ruled the Cosmos before the Olympian Gods took over. In addition, he ate his children. And the bacteria that is found in baby formula is named after him: *Cronobacter sakazakii* (also named is Japanese bacteriologist Riichi Sakazakii).

There are only four manufacturers of powdered baby formula in the US - Mead Johnson, Abbott, Nestle, and Perrigo. Abbott has about 42% of the market and they were shut down by the FDA because they found a different bug in their formula, not related to Cronobacter. Abbott denied and said that the bug was perhaps introduced by adding contaminated water to the powdered product. Hence, we have a baby formula shortage.

There is a 17% tariff on baby food imports from other countries, which is probably reasonable. But only four manufacturers in the US? That is almost a monopoly.

But let's look at that Cronobacter sakazakii. What does it do? Where does it live?

It lives everywhere. On your skin, on vegetables, on the fruit that you eat, on surfaces on your kitchen counter, it's everywhere. In powdered baby formulas the bug can survive for two years! Powdered infant formulas are not guaranteed to be sterile.

Powdered milk-based infant formulas are heat-treated during processing but, unlike liquid formula products, are not subjected to high temperatures for enough time to guarantee sterilization.

But having normal robust immune systems, we just have no interest in the bug. It can't hurt us - unless we are infants or the elderly, over 65 years old. The immune systems in these age groups are either underdeveloped or fading.

So what happens if Cronobacter sakazakii is ingested by infants or the elderly? Usually nothing. But rarely the bacterium attaches to the intestinal surface and can enter intestinal cells and destroy them. It then may enter the space in between the cells and enter the bloodstream.

The second way it can enter the bloodstream is by squeezing in between intestinal cell walls, especially in infants under 2 months old.

If many intestinal cells are damaged by bacterial endotoxins, a condition called *necrotizing enterocolitis* can develop. The symptoms are fever, poor feeding, excessive crying, low energy, and sometimes seizures.

But if the Cronobacter enters the bloodstream and causes *sepsis*, it may reach the brain and cause *meningitis*. In infants, meningitis has a high mortality rate (40%-80%). Surviving infants may develop ventriculitis (inflammation of the four fluid-filled spaces in the brain) and brain abscess.

The FDA temporarily closed the Abbott production facility - taking out almost half of the manufacturing capability in the US, although they never found Cronobacter in their formula. It is anticipated that Abbott will resume production in about two weeks, but it will take at least four more weeks for baby formulas to reach empty shelves in supermarkets and pharmacies.

Channel Islands Harbor Watch

Harbor Water Quality Funding & Support Requested May 17th Oxnard City Council Meeting

The Channel Islands Neighborhood Council's (CINC) Marine Advisory Committee (MAC) gave a presentation on the need to support and fund testing of the water samples they voluntarily collect per the Water Board-certified guidelines. These efforts are key to providing the data needed to get Water Board's support to help protect harbor water quality. Without this data, it will be difficult to get the Water Board to act to help prevent water quality disasters such as algae blooms, fish kill and unsafe water for people's recreational purposes. The CINC MAC, led by Chuck Carter, is asking for letter-writing support to the Oxnard City Council and the area's council member, Bert Perello. (see: www.cineighbors.com)

May 27th Harbor Department Issued Request for Proposal for Fisherman's Wharf Parcels

The Harbor Department has issued the Request for Proposal (RFP) seeking private developers/operators to redevelop the Fisherman's Wharf area in alignment with the 2021 Harbor Vision Plan. The County has indicated that a mix of recreational, retail, themed village, lodging, and entertainment is preferred. The RFP outlines regulatory jurisdictions and how they may impact the development process. It also describes submission format and required items, schedules, and evaluation process. It summarizes basic terms, including items such as option agreement fee, term of new lease, minimum rent, etc. Submissions that are consistent with the 2021 Vision Plan and current Public Works Plan will have an easier and faster approval process. Submission due date is Thursday, July 7, 2022. Once the RFPs are received, they will be reviewed by the Harbor Department and the Harbor Advisory Committee (HAC). It is possible that one or more proposals will be selected for follow-up, including a formal presentation or request for follow-up information. It is also possible all proposals are rejected.

June 10th Harbor's Public Works Plan Amendment #7 Goes to Coastal Commission

The Harbor Department announced it has submitted Amendment #7 to its Public Works Plan (PWPA7) to the California Coastal Commission (CCC) for approval at its **June 10th hearing this month**. This amendment was first proposed and approved at a Ventura County Board of Supervisors meeting on July 27, 2021.

The proposed amendment calls for reducing the total number of harbor boat slips from 2,150 to 1,950, a 200-slip reduction. The amendment keeps slips for boats under 32 feet at a minimum of 25% of total slips. But the harbor will no longer be required to maintain medium-sized slips for boats 32 feet to 38 feet at 25% of the total. It only requires the harbor to maintain a minimum of 50% of total slips for boats 38 feet or under.

As background, it should be noted that there has been no physical inventory done of the harbor's boat slips since at least 2008. The slip numbers provided reflect those reported by marina lessees, not necessarily what is actual and usable. It is also unclear if there is a standard and consistent method of counting boat slips. The Harbor & Beach Community Alliance (HBCA) requested in July 2021 that the County Internal Audit Department conduct an audit of boat slip inventory and their related revenue and asset evaluation. The Internal Audit Department responded saying: "We have included a future audit topic on our current year FY 2021-22 Internal Audit Plan to address boat slip inventory and revenue. We are planning to launch the audit next year." Recently, they confirmed: "We are planning to launch an audit of boat slip inventory and revenue in the coming fiscal year that begins July 1, 2022. During audit planning, we will consider the items presented in your [HBCA] email and letter dated July 26, 2021."

Effective July 1st Ventura County Approved Rate and Fee Schedule Increases for Harbor Rents, Fees and Insurance Requirements

At the May 24th Board Meeting, the Supervisors approved the Rate and Fee Schedule for County-Owned Marinas, Commercial Activity Permits, Special Use Permits, Deposits Required for Cost Recovery, and other Harbor Miscellaneous Fees and Service (e.g. towing and/or pumping, impound or abandonment, coin-operated boat wash).

This rate and fee schedule goes into effect on July 1, 2022.

CIYC Racers' Report By Cap'n Jane Thomas



To make up for my brief report last month, I've written a long one this month. I'll start where I left off before April -- when a lot of our racers were traveling beyond our local waters to compete among large, competitive fleets...

Helly Hansen World Regatta. JEDI co-owners Gareth Jones and Dan Maxwell, their families, and their all-CIYC crew: Kinsey Cohen, Andrew Clements, and Nick Walters, trailered JEDI (J24) to San Diego for the Helly Hansen World Regatta, March 25-27. Entry was open to more than 10 one-design and mixed classes. The J24 class was one of the larger classes with 12 entries, including 3 boats that JEDI competed against during the CIYC Midwinter Regatta in February. The 'local' entries all made the top half of the fleet. JADED took 1st place (Deke Klatt, VYC), TAKE FIVE got 2nd (Susan Taylor, CYC), and ABRACADABRA (Dan Chepley, VYC) and JEDI tied for 5th; however, ABRACADBRA's better score on the first race broke the tie and put JEDI in 6th place.

Newport to Ensenada (N2E): As happened often this spring, the forecasts for wind and sea conditions before, during, and after the 74th Newport to Ensenada race (N2E), April 22-23, included multiple gale, neargale, and small craft warnings. As the race date approached, I was nervously watching the marine forecasts, questioning the safety and comfort of my crew and my boat (33ft 7100lb), and dreading the uphill return delivery... Then I learned that a friend from Marina del Rey was going to withdraw from N2E because she had lost half her crew at the last minute. So Kelly Sherwood (CIYC/CIWSA), Alison Rowe (CIWSA), Dawnita Fendley (VYC), and I agreed to jump ship from WAILANI and race on SCCYC's RASCAL (38ft, 14,400lb) with Capt. Kathy, co-owner Monica, and crew: Tim and Jake.

The meteorologists' forecasts were right! From the start N2E racers saw 18-19kt winds which soon built to 25-30kts with 8-10ft seas into the evening. It was a rhumb line, broad reach to pass a few miles outside the Coronado Islands. Many of the multi-hulls, maxis, and ultra-lights went out a bit farther for a better angle to Ensenada later and saw the biggest wind and waves. I heard of multiple boats that shredded their spinnakers (e.g., WAHOO, 5150, et al) or had other problems in the high winds. We all had to work hard to maintain rudder control in the high wind and powerful seas. Nearly 10% of those who had signed up didn't start, and our class (PHRF-C) shrank by almost 50%. We got 6th place and were happy to have beaten a local boat, PARADISE FOUND (Jim Albert, VYC).

Maxi-boat RIO 100 (StFYC) set a new N2E record with elapsed time of 7:02:17, and 5 other maxis beat the previous record set in 2016. The catamaran WAHOO's (Bill Gibbs, PBYC) elapsed time was only 9:23:19, and NOSA's Staff Commodore won the top 3 N2E trophies for the 5th time.

In the PHRF UL-B class elapsed time for CIYC's CHRONIC (Farr 400M, Lonnie Jarvis with Chuck Grethel, Shaun Plomteaux, et al) was 11:38:50, which corrected out to 3rd Place. (Ask Chuck to show you videos with boat speed around 20!) After their N2E finish, they headed straight back to San Diego and sent the crew home until the following weekend.



Yachting Cup: San Diego Yacht Club hosted the Yachting Cup on April 30 - May 1. Having not done well in 2021 Yachting Cup, CHRONIC's performance in 2022 surely surprised her competitors, including the winner of her N2E class the previous weekend! Over the 6 races she earned 1st place overall in her class with four 1st places, a 2nd, and a 3rd.

More CIYC Racers' Report

PBYC Spring Series #3: PBYC hosted the 3rd and final race of their Spring Series on March 26. CIYC entrants VELERO (Islander 29, Brent Swanson) won 1st in the Non-Spinnaker fleet and WAILANI (Tartan Ten, Jane Thomas) won 2nd in Spinnaker B class.

AYC Island Series, Anacapa to Port (May 7): Only 3 boats participated, 2 AYC boats in Spinnaker class and CIYC's VELERO (Brent Swanson) in Non-Spinnaker class. All boats finished.

Hardway Race. On May 14, SBSC and PBYC cosponsored the Hardway Race. After starting near Santa Barbara and rounding a nearby buoy to port, the courses varied by fleet, and all boats finished at the Ventura Harbor entrance. The "Hardway Course" goes around Santa Cruz Island to port, the Coastwise Spinnaker/Multihull course rounds Anacapa Island to port, and the Coastwise Non-Spinnaker course passes Platforms C, Habitat, and Grace to port. Among the 6 boats that sailed the Hardway course (67nm) CIYC's CHRONIC took 1st place. CIYC's VELERO (Brent Swanson) won 1st place among the 5 boats that sailed the Coastwise Spinnaker course (47nm). Reportedly, the winds were better than expected, and all boats finished before 10pm.

Commodore Classic: On May 21, VYC hosted its annual Commodore Classic race to thank all Commodores for serving their clubs. As encouragement to Commodores whose boats don't usually race, no entry fees are charged and adjustments to a boat's handicap rating are given for ground tackle, fixed props, Dacron sails, etc. Racing as a single class with 10 Commodores aboard, the ratings for this year's 6 entrants (3 VYC, 2 AYC, 1 CIYC) ranged from 39 to 163 (with adjustments), and most are frequent, competitive racing boats (Performance Factor <1.75). The wind and seas were near perfect! VYC entrants took 1st, 2nd, and 4th; AYC took 3rd and 5th; CIYC's WAILANI took 6th (5th scored with PF adjustment formula).

Wet Wednesday Racing in Channel Islands Harbor (AYC) and Ventura Harbor (VYC) began April 6 and will run until September 14. If you are a sailor and want to try racing, WWs are a great way to get more experience. Many CIYC skippers are willing to take extra crew on WW and will occasionally need a last-minute crew replacement. WW races start at 6:00pm, so boat call is usually 5:00pm at the latest. Contact me or any CIYC racing skipper if you'd like to be added to their call list for WW or weekend racing.

Race Committee (RC): Thanks to the successful late-February fundraiser for RC and J24 expenses, 2 new inflatable tetrahedral buoys and a 12V pump have arrived! The next CIYC race is the Wild Bill Rig Race on June 25. We are looking for RC volunteers, the RC Boat, a post-race food leader, and food and prep assistance. Please contact Rear Commodore Lisa Medlen or me if you can help out.

J24 Fleet Report: Gareth Jones had discovered that TINY DANCER's primary winches were completely seized up and would not turn at all. He took them to his shop and dismantled, unseized, cleaned, lubricated, and reassembled them! They move smoothly again! And, thanks to Shaun Plomteaux, CRITTER has a new battery. Shaun's also checking over the outboards for TINY DANCER and HOT LIPS. All 3 J24s need some additional attention – some technical jobs, others just painting, organization, and general cleanup. If you have a few hours to spend, please contact me!




