
Anglers' Corner - April 2019

Circuit to Nowhere

So I went to my favorite YouTube site, which deals with plasma physics, electricity in the universe, quasars, black holes, and quantum entanglement. Great stuff.

Environmental Justice Policy Unanimously Approved By Coastal Commission – A Historic Event

On Friday, March 8th, the Coastal Commission approved its Environmental Justice Policy, a historic first. The policy gives the Commission the authority to consider environmental justice issues such as the level of inclusive access to public recreation and affordable housing in any new coastal development. This involves evaluating a proposed development's "potential to adversely or disproportionately affect a historically disadvantaged group's ability to reach and enjoy the coast."

The Commission staff spent over a year meeting with and listening to environmental justice stakeholders, including community groups, social justice leaders, and public agencies. Over 100 groups and individuals were contacted by email, phone, and in-person interviews. The staff hosted webinars, developed a newsletter, listserv, and more, to ensure public participation.

A major supporter and contributor to the writing of the policy was the Central Coast Alliance for a Sustainable Economy (CAUSE). CAUSE is a major organizer and advocate of social, economic, and environmental justice. In their speech supporting the policy, their representative, Lucia Marquez, named Oxnard as an example of a community where the policy can make a difference. She described Oxnard as having a "coast lined with three power plants, two naval bases, one deep water port, a sewage plant, and several former landfills and old dumping sites, including an EPA Superfund toxic waste site.

By comparison, surrounding affluent coastal communities like Malibu, Santa Monica, Montecito, and Santa Barbara have coastlines free of power plants or other heavy industry. It is no coincidence that Oxnard is 85% people of color."

The Harbor & Beach Community Alliance (HBCA) also spoke in support of the policy. As one of only 12 small boat harbors left along the California coast, the Channel Islands Harbor is a rare and precious resource within the City of Oxnard. HBCA said that harbor public waterfront land must be protected for all. HBCA asked the Commission and its staff to exercise due diligence in using their powers to ensure equitable community benefits are provided in each and every new coastal development, especially in communities like Oxnard, where the public needs to overcome the significant monies and influence that developers, cities, and counties use.

No Good Reason for Holding Up the Hotel Project – Peninsula Revetment Approved by Coastal Commission

On March 7, 2019, the Coastal Commission (CCC) approved the Harbor Department's Notice of Impending Development (NOID) for the Revetment work on the harbor peninsula. The Hotel Project's NOID was approved over 9 months ago after taking 2 years after the approved Public Works Plan amendment – totaling nearly 3 years - after strong public and County Board support for the project.

Back in January of this year, the Harbor Director, Mark Sandoval, told the community that before the rock revetment work can start, the old hotel must be demolished. The County had approval from the Coastal Commission to start demolition back in July 2018. So why delay the demolition? There is, and never was, a good reason for the delay. The community believes the County has a hidden motive for holding up the hotel project. The County claims the hotel project needs City street land for 29 parking spaces. Nowhere in the Hotel NOID is there mention of the need for City street land. The Commission-approved Hotel NOID requires 344 parking spaces, but the County provided 379, an excess of 35 parking spaces. This shows the required parking for the hotel can be met without City street land. It suggests the County may be more concerned about the apartment developer's (Channel Islands Harbor Properties LLC) "undetermined project" than the much-needed moderately priced visitor-serving hotel, restaurant, and marina. These projects clearly promote harbor revitalization that includes and serves all. Further delay of the hotel project is irresponsible and the County should be held accountable.

Continuing Promises of Reopening the Whale's Tail With Fresca II

Since July 2017 when the County selected Fresca II to operate at the old Whale's Tail, there is no lease agreement, no renovation, only two shipping containers in the parking lot. Meanwhile, the restaurant building's deteriorating condition continues to worsen. In December 2018, in a memo to the community and John Zaragoza, the Harbor Director, Mark Sandoval, wrote "the lease will be going to the Board in January or February at the latest. The lease issues surrounded lease details which are now behind us."

At the February Harbor Academy, the community was told that the Fresca II lease agreement would now be going to the Board of Supervisors in April. The County's sense of urgency in moving forward community-supported development is clearly lacking. The County's actions simply do not support its claims of concern for revitalization of the harbor. The proven way to revitalize a harbor is to support development that promotes the fundamental purpose of a harbor – water recreation activities and visitor-serving facilities and attractions.

This means the hotel project and a diverse range of appealing and moderately priced restaurants and attractions, not more high-end residential development.




