





### Message From 2021 Historian Chasin Turnier



I am sure that many of us would agree that the year 2020 had its fair share of problems. Importantly for the club, it marked the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Channel Islands Yacht club. While we did not get to celebrate as we would have liked, we have decided to let the celebrations continue into this year. Now we can all celebrate together, looking back to the past, and forward to a bright future.

Officially, the Channel Islands Yacht Club had their first meeting in January of 1960, but preparations for the founding of the club began in 1959. The new harbor master of Oxnard Harbor sent a letter to 20 interested men, asking them to come together and found a yacht club to increase interest in recreational boating in the Oxnard Harbor area. Until that time, most recreational yachting was taking place at Santa Barbara Harbor, because the Port Hueneme and Oxnard areas were considered predominantly industrial boating areas.

Sixteen of the interested people came together on 24 November, 1959, and they decided to form a club with H. Catlin elected chairman of the soon-to-be club. The members met again on 8 December, 1959, to elect 9 directors of the club and to choose a name. Some members wanted to call the club Anacapa Yacht Club. In a 9 to 6 vote, though, Channel Islands Yacht Club was selected as the official name in a nod to the name for the Oxnard Beach area, then called Channel Islands.

In January of 1960, the Channel Islands Yacht Club held their first official meeting, and Chairman Catlin changed his title from Chairman, to an appropriately yacht club-themed title, Commodore. Dues were set at \$9 per year, and a club burgee was designed to really make the club official. January is not, however, considered yachting season in most places. Of course,

for Californians, yachting season is all year round. Opening Day was celebrated on Memorial Day that first year of 1960, and all the way until 1968. In 1969, the Opening Day celebration split from the harbor's Memorial Day celebrations and was celebrated on June 22, instead.

Opening Days are traditionally considered the start of the yachting season in colder climes, and the first day that white clothing can be worn to welcome summer. A cannon has also been part of Opening Day celebrations since the origin of yacht clubs. The firing of the cannon is traditionally used to break up ice in yachting harbors to allow boats to sail out. While the only ice in our harbor is in our drinks, a cannon is still a part of our celebrations. The first firing of our cannon took place at the 22 June, 1969, Opening Day, and this cannon, built by member Dave Sheehan, is still in use today.

For many years, Opening Day took place either the last week of May or in early to late June. During the renovations of the Club in 1975-76, Opening Day was celebrated despite ongoing heavy construction. Dave Sheehan again lent his brass-working skills — this time to make the rails for the new bar for the 1976 Opening Day. 1980 appears to be the first year that Channel Islands Yacht Club celebrated opening day in April. Though we are getting a late start this year, the club has continued to celebrate Opening Day in April without worrying about any ice floes in the harbor. Opening Days are an important part of Yacht Club culture and one we proudly continue to celebrate each year as we have for the last 60 years. Here's to another 60 years!

I met the folks at the club for weigh-in at 5 pm and Bea was bouncing around like a teenager. She kept saying, "69 years and no one told me how much fun fishing is!" "I've never had a fishing license before." The reason for her excitement was obvious when they opened the ice chest and took out a very nice 8 lb. 2 oz Halibut

that she had caught. But wait! That is not the fish for the tourney. She picked up another monster Halibut out of the chest - it weighed out at 22 lbs., taking first place!

Joyce Sheridan took 2<sup>nd</sup> with a very nice 1 lb., 15 oz Red Rockfish, and Shari Erickson took 3<sup>rd</sup> with a fine 1 lb. 12 oz Ocean Whitefish. Bea also ended up with the May Big Fish award of \$50.00 with the 8 lb. 2 oz Halibut. (Both Bea Beverly and Sherry Erickson passed away some time ago.)

### Channel Islands Harbor Watch By Rene Aiu

### "Cooperation Agreement" for Channel Islands Harbor Unanimously Approved by Both County Board of Supervisors and Oxnard City Council

The agreements are a positive step in moving forward the widely supported Hyatt House Hotel, the Rio Urbana project, AND other non-controversial harbor development. Since the end of the 1963 Agreement in March 2015 and the termination of the Master Tax Sharing Agreement in 2018, the County and City have been at an impasse over the issues of jurisdiction, tax sharing, and maintenance responsibility at the Harbor. Both County and City staff recommended the approval of the Channel Islands Harbor Cooperation Agreement. The agreement, as well as other related documents, can be viewed on both the County and City websites.

The Channel Islands Harbor Cooperation Agreement and Master Tax Sharing Agreement address the County's and the City's common concerns and public benefits issues. Matters of public interest are:

- 1. The City of Oxnard retains its jurisdiction over the harbor and agrees to facilitate mutually agreed upon harbor development. This means when the County's proposed development is mutually agreed upon, the City will, if required by the project, process amendments and support the project at the California Coastal Commission. Essentially, this does not impact Oxnard's right to deny or approve Local Coastal Plan amendments for projects it does not support, as it did with the Fisherman's Wharf 400-apartment complex.
- The County and City agree to work together through the Harbor Vision process to identify development goals for the Harbor, including infrastructure to facilitate "greater public access and utilization of this coastal resource,...

that are consistent with the goals of the California Coastal Act."

 Oxnard will issue building permits for projects within the Harbor, as it has historically done, with the exception of the Hyatt House Hotel project, in order to avoid any further delays in the project. However, Oxnard will receive the hotel development fees.

It is interesting to note that Section 6 of the agreement makes it clear that their positions on the issuance of building permits is not consistent and that both the City and County reserve their respective rights and legal positions on this matter.

- 4. Oxnard will fund 50 percent of the Harbor's maintenance costs up to \$200,000 annually for 3-5 years.
- 5. Over these five years, Oxnard will invest in public area improvements such as: replacing the Kiddie Beach and Peninsula Park public restrooms, repaving Peninsula Road after the hotel is completed, and repaving parking lots with the County, for an amount not to exceed \$2.26 million. The County will share in the cost of some of these public improvements as well.
- 6. The County will continue to assist the City in evaluating solutions to the Harbor's water quality issue, including in funding solutions.
- 7. The new Master Tax Sharing Agreement will be for 25 years and the terms are essentially the same as the 1983 tax-sharing agreement, except that this agreement may not be terminated by either party during the first 15 years.

### Issues the public should be aware of and follow over the next few months:

1. The Harbor has been operating without a standard development process, though both the County and City of Oxnard have one in place. A standard development process helps avoid inconsistencies, unfairness, lack of transparency, and, at worse, abuse. Without one, qualified developers may be discouraged from making proposals because the guidelines and process are uncertain.

The establishment of a standard Harbor process, "engagement process", for development projects, should include a published competitive RFP, Request for Proposal. RFPs should specify the required project parameters (density, height, public amenities and mix and composition of the mix) to avoid unnecessary controversy and developer frustrations. (Note the Harbor has never issued a competitive RFP only RFQs, Request for Qualifications – these are very different processes with different objectives.)

2. Though the County plans to use the Vision Plan to develop certain parcels at the Harbor, the current Vision Plan is not a Harbor Master Plan. A master plan for the entire harbor is

vital to ensure that fluctuating economic pressures do not drive short-sighted development decisions that may be regretted later, and the "permanency" of most harbor development makes it almost impossible to rectify. The Harbor's Public Works Plan is 35 years old. The Coastal Commission has strongly recommended updating the PWP to avoid more piecemeal development and its problems. Updating the PWP could simultaneously be done while developing non-controversial projects.

3. Many of the recommendations in the 2008 Channel Islands Harbor Public Areas & Design Guidelines (see the 2008 Plan on the Harbor's website) that were unanimously approved by the County Board and were, and still are, widely supported by the public, are also recommended in the Vision Plan 2021. These improvements are consistent with the Coastal Act and the Environmental Justice Policy and will bring more visitors and make the harbor "a place of great variety of fun activities with more attractive, enjoyable, walkable, comfortable network of beautiful waterfront public space." This is the basic goal of the Vision Plan.

Let's get the whole e-boat fleet showing!



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

### s/v WAILANI and Team Wahines Go to Ensenada

Why would anyone want to sail a 10m race boat from Channel Islands Harbor to Ensenada and back again in April? In hindsight, I think it's mostly the personal challenge – taking the steps to improve the safety of the boat and crew, building my self-confidence, and earning the confidence of the crew. What I wasn't expecting was the camaraderie of participating in the 73<sup>rd</sup> Newport to Ensenada race ("N2E")!

I signed up for this race in January last year -before I looked at the daunting list of safety requirements and many other boat projects to be
done. When they canceled the 2020 race, I let
my entry fees ride and was thankful I had another year! I worked diligently into the summer and
resumed working through "my lists" with vigor
from January 2021 until the start!

I was loading the final safety gear aboard when a crew member opted out. I realized the weight of the extra gear had probably already replaced her, so 5 crew suddenly seemed like enough for the race: CIYC members, Jane Thomas, Kelly Sherwood-Sloan, Wailani O'Herlihy, and Janie Brockman, as well as an unnamed non-member crew. We were the only all-female entry this year. (I am retired but everyone else is still working, so we scheduled the delivery legs for the weekends before and after N2E. Deliveries included 3-4 race crew and CIYC members, Tracie and Emilie West. I stayed with the boat in between.)

The N2E start was overcast with a nice breeze. We were near the port end at the start and remained somewhat leeward as the fleet separated. We tacked up and back a few times to take advantage of several wind shifts in the afternoon. We were off La Jolla when the wind dropped off and darkness came. The wind blew on and off through the night, but Islas Coronados were still to port until well after the sun rose. The wind increased gradually throughout the day, and we finished downwind just outside Marina Coral in 17kts of breeze at 16:44:04! As

we found out later, we placed 8<sup>th</sup> among 14 boats in our class – not bad for a bunch of old ladies (average age 62.4yrs)! Marina Coral staff guided us to our slip and quickly tied our lines before the health nurse came to take our temperatures. With our health certificate and passports in hand, we went to the Marina office and then to an adjacent building for Customs and Immigration. After 20-30 minutes and some fees, the paperwork for entering the boat and crew into Mexico was complete!

And we were off to the hotel patio where they had set up a big welcoming sign, a bar, taco service, and live band Saturday afternoon/evening to welcome arriving racers! The band played a wide variety of popular American dance tunes and all members were very talented, so we stayed and danced with the other racers!
