

# Anglers' Corner

#### **WSB Pen update:**

We have purchased the materials we need to remove and replace the predator and containment nets as well as the shade cloth roof. By the time this goes to press, we should have the required permits from the county to do the job. Here is what we plan to do:

- We will cover over the middle pen opening with a tarp structure. Temporarily cover the other two openings with the old containment nets by hanging the nets by the bottom seams and piling the sides up above the water. This will keep sea lions and diving birds from making incursions into the structure until the new predator net is installed.
- Divers will remove the chain from the exterior predator net by cutting the zip ties holding it to the outside of the net. Affix a line to the chain and pull the chain out of the water to evaluate if reusable.
- After the chain has been removed, divers will cut the old predator net into sections small enough to be handled, but leave them hanging on the structure until all are cut.
- After all the cuts are made, we will schedule the rental of a backhoe/skip loader and have a dumpster available at the old launch ramp.
- Using boats and divers with "lift bags" and tow lines, we will haul the sections over to the launch ramp and use the backhoe to lift the sections out of the water and put them into the dumpster.

Angling is slow this time of year, so here is another a story from my "Valkyrie Log." As many know, I recently sold the Valkyrie to Rande Lance, a new CIYC member.

#### **August 2003:**

We left CIH at 6am Sunday after picking up some squid from a commercial boat anchored inside the Breakwater. Onboard were Kevin Brown, who fished with me for the first time last month, and his friend Aki Atsumi, who moved here 3 years ago from NY and has never fished the west coast before. Both are in the US Coast Guard, stationed at Channel Islands CG Station.

After reading posts and talking to friends over the previous week, we hoped to get into the Yellow Tail at Anacapa. Although I knew that the tides were nowhere near as good as they were just 2 days earlier, you fish when you can.

We hit Anacapa and set up a few drifts in the spot Bruce Derksen gave us. On the first drop we hooked up a short Ling - safely released - then fishing died; couldn't get anything to go. So, we moved west toward the fleet at Fishcamp and worked some meter marks outside the other boats. We saw and raised Badger, and they said at that time they only knew of 1 YT on the boats.



The wind was constantly increasing, and we couldn't slow down the drift, so we pulled in close to the island to anchor up on the edge of the fleet. But the rode jammed, and we couldn't get enough out to hold in the wind, and this was ALL chain rode! The wind was just screaming off the island. Finally, we pulled anchor and headed to Santa Cruz where we found the lee off Yellow Banks to be quite comfortable. We started working some shallow water ridges and started hitting some nice fish: Calico Lings and White Fish.

Aki caught his first Ling Cod, then his second which was a real beauty. Kevin caught what we thought at first was a YT, but when we brought him up it was an excellent-sized Ocean White Fish. I told him that if it had been a YT he would have had a tougher fight, but the White Fish was no slouch as table fare.

The bite started so late in the afternoon that we didn't start back until almost 7PM. When we hit the inside of the Anacapa Passage, we picked up the wind and breaking rollers 4 to 7 ft at about 4 to 5 seconds: nasty!

We even took one over the starboard quarter that dumped about 60gals of seawater on the deck, and we were forced to quarter the seas for awhile, then surf the smaller stuff.

While all this was going on, the Coast Guard was receiving a call from a guy in a 21-foot Bayliner who said he was by the "orange oil rig" on his way back from Anacapa and could they give him a course heading to get to Oxnard? He said it was his first time out with his boat, and he was lost, and it was getting dark!! He didn't have a GPS or Charts but did have a compass. We assumed he was talking about oil rig Gina. We were at least 30 mins away so we headed that way and monitored the transmissions. As it turned out, he was indeed lost. The boat was found up by the Mandalay Power station, not Gina, and only about a mile offshore. It was a good thing the CG was able to find him using Radio Direction Finder. They escorted him back into CIH, and I hope they suggested some boating safety courses to him.

We didn't get back to the slip until 9 PM and Kevin and Aki pitched right in and made short work of the boat cleanup – Aah, youth! - wish I still had that agility and energy.

#### What's New in the Health Sciences

- 1) **Weed:** This may be of interest to one or two club members. Scientists discovered a new cannabinoid: *Tetrahydrocannabiphorol* (THCP), which is allegedly 30 times more potent than THC. I wonder what effect this will have on legalized marijuana use in the future. Will growers selectively cultivate the variety that has the greatest amount of this newly discovered active ingredient? Will there be more zombies driving around under the influence?
- 2) **Flu:** Two years ago, we had a really bad flu epidemic. But this season promises to be even worse. Both A and B influenza viruses have been implicated. Please be reminded that every year in the US seasonal flu causes thousands of hospital admissions and deaths. The flu virus resides in the micro-droplets that are expelled from the nose and mouth of someone who coughs or sneezes. If you are close enough to a person who coughs or sneezes, you can breathe in the virus and become ill. The same goes for kissing and close hugging. The virus can also live for a short time on doorknobs, phones, etc. After you touch these objects and then touch your mouth, nose, or eyes, you may contract the virus. Wash your hands frequently, stop smooching, and stay home if you are sick. Get vaccinated.
- 3) **Virome:** As previously reported in Doc Lines, we each carry in our guts 3-5 lbs. of bacteria, the so-called **microbiome**. But even more numerous than bacteria are viruses in the gut, making up a **virome**. The virome contains a subgroup called a bacteriophage. A newborn's first poop (meconium) contains no viruses. However, just one week after birth, each gram of baby's poop contains about 100 million virus particles, most of which are bacteriophages. Who knew? What do they do? We know they destroy bacteria, but we don't exactly know their influence on the bacterial population in the gut. A range of diseases, including inflammatory bowel disease, chronic fatigue syndrome, obesity, *Clostridium difficile*, and colitis are attributed to the bacterial composition in the gut. What role the bacteriophage plays in all of this is now under intensive study.
- 4) **Measles:** An outbreak in the Democratic Republic of the Congo in 2019 made 350,000 sick and resulted in 6,000 deaths. This is a highly contagious airborne disease with symptoms of a runny nose, cough, sore eyes, and rash. Complications include pneumonia, convulsions, and encephalitis. Lack of vaccination is to blame.
- 5) Less Pesticide? Someone surmised that zebra stripes repel insects. So, in a well-designed study, they painted black cows with white stripes to resemble zebra stripes. And it worked. "Zebra cows" had 50% fewer insect bites compared to the control group. Could this be applied to humans? Do football referees have fewer bites? How about prisoners? Should we paint our boats in zebra stripes to get rid of pesky kelp flies?

#### Last Month's Currents Doc Lines - Wind Turbine Issues

Jan 2020 Currents reported multiple concerns with wind energy. These "Cons" were provided without any discussion of the considerable, validated, and verified "Pros." Please see Doc Lines (<a href="https://www.ciyc.com/page/currents">https://www.ciyc.com/page/currents</a>), Ref. (a). Because of limited space the reader is referred to an admittedly wind industry narrative, which includes 'both' the positive and the negative aspects, (<a href="http://www.windustry.org/pros cons wind energy">http://www.windustry.org/pros cons wind energy</a>); Ref. (b).

Wind power can be a cornerstone of a sustainable energy future for CA, the US, and the rest of the world because it's affordable, provides jobs, substantial and distributed revenue, and treads lightly on our environment without causing pollution, generating hazardous wastes, or depleting natural resources. Embracing wind energy today will lay the foundation for a healthy tomorrow. Ref. (b) applies.

Let's talk wallets and where your tax dollars 'currently' go.

"All energ systems are subsidized, and wind is no exception. However, wind receives considerably less than other forms of energy. According to Renewable Energy World magazine, conventional energy receives US\$300 billion in subsidies per year, while renewable energy has received less than US\$20 billion of tax-payers' money in the last 30 years. A study published by researchers at Harvard in 2011 found that the full life cycle cost of coal power is between about 9.5 and 27 cents per kilowatt-hour, most of which is paid by taxpayers in the form of increased health-related costs. These "indirect" subsidies amount to between \$175 billion and over \$500 billion/year. (Numbers are in 2008 dollars)"; Ref. (b) applies.

#### Response to Ref. (a)'s list of wind power deficiencies. Paraphrasing just some of Ref. (a) concerns:

- 1. Wind energy takes up too much space. Response: No one's talking full energy coverage by wind alone. The current placement and future placement for wind farms in CA has been mainly desert (near Palm Springs) and farmland (Altamont Pass- southeast of San Francisco) 'far' from local residents.
- 2. Wind power's intermittent and needs expensive conventional power plant backup. Response. The New York Times noted..." Concern that if we continue to build up wind power that days with calm air will lead to power-less nights represents a misunderstanding of the grid, the wind energy sector, and the proposals of these energy advocates. While this would be true in a situation where a home or a collection of homes were connected to and powered by a singular wind farm, that is not at all what is being proposed or a representation of reality anywhere in the country." Ref. (b) applies.
- 3. Health issues like people living in the vicinity of turbines suffering loss of sleep and headaches. Response. Yes," Shadow flicker occurs when the blades of the rotor cast a shadow as they turn. They are also noisy. Designers of wind farms avoid placing turbines in locations where shadow flicker would be a problem any significant amount of time." Ref. (b) applies.
- 4. Environmental effects: "It is estimated that each wind turbine kills, on average, 200 birds and 400 bats per year." Response: Significantly more migratory birds are killed each year due to feral cats and fracking (oil) open wastewater pits along migratory flight paths. The industry is working on this issue. And, the Endangered Species Act is being amended to include homo sapiens extant.

### **Next Steps for Fisherman's Wharf Revitalization**

### Issuance of a Request for Proposal in 2020

There has been a lack of transparency in harbor management since 2004, especially concerning the Fisherman's Wharf area. Over time this has created wide community mistrust in harbor management.

The Harbor Department has admitted it has never issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to obtain competitive development proposals for Fisherman's Wharf. The Harbor Department deviated from this standard procedure. There is a good reason for having both a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) and a Request for Proposal when it involves a large development, like Fisherman's Wharf that is critical to the harbor.

There is a big difference in the purposes and in the resulting information produced by these two procedures. An RFQ requires information on credentials and past projects and generally identifies the project goals. An RFP requires details of what is proposed. It defines how it accomplishes the required project goals and typically requires a site plan, concept renderings, elevation, and other elements. It is after the proposal is selected that exclusivity should be granted.

This is why an official Request for Proposal process is so important. A Request for Qualifications is not a substitute for a Request for Proposal.

There is an unsolicited proposal that was covered up by the Harbor Department while it claimed there is "no magic developer" for Fisherman's Wharf without a residential component. The "Strawberry Village" may not be the "magic developer" but it certainly shows there are other options to revitalizing Fisherman's Wharf that will drive visitors and maximize public access to the harbor.

What would be the harm of now opening up Fisherman's Wharf and all other development areas to competitive proposals through an open and transparent Request for Proposal (RFP) process? Issuance of an RFP would help restore transparency and public trust in harbor management.




