#### WEATHER:

Normal weather? Not even close. I think we have rolled into an Indian winter. Today May 12 as I jot down a couple of thoughts looking out my office window overlooking the Ventura Marina with heavy clothes and heater on low I'm beginning to wonder when we will be getting our April weather.

With the day's being in the low 60 degree range and the ocean water temperatures ranging from 52 to 54 degrees I find it hard to get motivated to go offshore. I can never remember air and water temperature being so low in the middle of May.

The trick is leave on your trip early and make 6-7 hours a day. I find myself making long day trips getting very tired for the same results.

#### FISHING:

I Have made only one trip this past month with Jim Pennsinger on board his 35 Cabo "FREEDOM". We left his dock in Mandalay Bay at 8;30 and headed to the bait dock. We loaded a scoop of nice bait and headed towards mouth of the harbor for a good day's fishing when we got a cell call emergency from his wife wanting to know if he had taken his keys to his car blocking hers in the garage and her and her daughter only transportation to the malls the day before Mothers Day. He did the right thing he took them half way home to Captain Hooks Landing for her. NICE GUY

Well finally we were on our way and ran the boat about 200-300 feet front the surf all the way to the Blue Roof Apartments (Ventura/ LA County line). After seeing no birds feeding or sign of fish activity we decided to go to Harrisons Reef 4 miles of the beach.

We were able to spend 2 or 3 hours catching rockfish and sand dabs. After we caught three handfuls of rockfish we headed back to the beach to try for halibut. We did not have any luck and ran home getting back to the harbor about 3:30 PM.

The surf fishing has been fair with the Leopard sharks giving the surf fishermen a run for there money on 25 pound class line and using mackerel for bait.

#### **BOATS**

We are experiencing some interesting times with the rising costs of all parts of boat ownership. These cost have pretty well excluded the labor class persons from having the privilege of having access to the offshore experience.

My son and I have been looking into the future to see how more people can enjoy boating and came back to the shared ownership concept a lot like the Freedom Partnership I was involved with. This will be especially attractive when as the boating industry manufactures are warning of a \$8.00 per gallon cost of fuel in the next year.

We will be concentrating of the shared concept in the coming months and I will report its success to all.

#### MEET RAMS, DAVE AND SANDRA LOCHRIDGE

Sandra and Dave got into boating in 2005 when they purchased their new Bayliner. For years, Dave had dreamed of sailing and cruising but, when the time came to purchase a boat, they decided that they didn't know how to sail. Luckily, their boat was docked across the fairway from fellow RAM,

Mike Taylor. After a handful of weekends shouting "hellos" across the water, Mike backed his boat up to theirs and invited them sailing. Dave had not been on a sailboat since he was a teenager when his girlfriend's parents took him sailing on the Columbia River. He remembered how exhilarating it was - tacking through the bridge supports under I-5 was especially fun!

After a handful of outings with Mike, Dave got invited to come along on a race. Although he does not remember which race it was, he remembers Mike's enthusiasm. The energy was completely addicting and Dave wanted to be a part of it. Even when there was no wind, Mike wouldn't give up. Dave recalls a race, around Anacapa. There was no wind on the back side and they were going in circles trying to find a breeze. Mike was running around changing sails trying to get the boat to move. Dave recalls how Mike threw up his "wind seeker" sail and ran around the boat like a crazy man trying to find the wind. "Who does that just to win a coffee cup? Mike Taylor does". Dave was completely hooked.

Another especially fond memory was the "Frenchy's Rum Run", the first race with Mike's new headsail. Mike was like a kid on Christmas when this race started. The wind was fantastic and they were pointing much higher than Harmony had before. She was doing well against the other boats. For most of the windward leg, they were trying to catch another boat but just couldn't reel her in. As they neared Frenchy's, the wind completely dropped. Mike's new headsail performed flawlessly in the light wind and they finally reeled in and passed the other boat. There was absolutely no wind as they rounded - it was only residual boat speed that kept them moving. The other boat lost her speed and took forever to round the mark. By that time they were away from the island with full sails. "Fabulous!"

Dave raced with Mike for most of 2007. During 2007, Dave's lovely wife, Sandra, saw his excitement and started coming along for Wet Wednesdays. She too, got hooked. They have since moved on to sailing on other boats with other people. The skills that Mike taught them make them confident on any boat they go on. #### VESSEL SAFETY CHECKS



The Vessel Safety Check is a complimentary check of your boat conducted by members of the Auxiliary, confirming that it meets both federal and state requirements for safety. No citations are issued and the results of the safety check are not reported to any enforcement agency, but a decal is awarded to display if the vessel has passed the examination.

An example of some of the items checked include:

- Personal Flotation Devices (life jackets)
- Registration and numbering
- Navigation lights
- Ventilation
- Fire extinguishers
- Distress signals (flares, horn, etc.)
- Battery cover and connections

All of these items are currently required by state and federal laws and, if missing or non-operating, can result in a citation if your vessel is inspected by the Coast Guard.


The Vessel Safety Check gives you a risk-free way to check that you meet the legal minimums and to potentially avoid a citation later.

In the feeder race to Newport Mike had to wait around looking for wind and the reverse start certainly didn't favor him. *5150* was able to overtake Mike well short of Newport harbor. They did finish in front of several other boats and therefore were encouraged about the major event to follow.

They gybed often, but their hard work paid off and they finished a creditable 7<sup>th</sup> out of 14 well sailed boats and were the second Schock to finish. Well done Mike.

#### **Bob Cooke Memorial Double Handed Race 2**

The non spinnaker fleet saw only 3 boats, all CIYC RAMs, *Zuma Jay* being the first to cross the line in a near perfect start with Velero close behind. Dennis West in *West Wing* brought up the rear but was soon to draw ahead on the first leg to Gina. After getting around the rig with the wind at a steady 10-12 knots, all boats had to fight the chop on the way back to Mandalay, with *West Wing* using her weight and waterline to good advantage. However, position isn't everything and although *West Wing* was halfway back to the harbor, the two smaller boats were still hanging in there. Both *Zuma jay* and *Velero* were carried into the harbor at speed and that was enough for *Velero* to take first place with *Zuma Jay* 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3rd was Dennis West.

In Spinnaker class, the wind blew a little and made life challenging for all. *Funatic* ably sailed by Rod Abbott and his grandson Cody Schlub were beaten by only 6 seconds for 1<sup>st</sup> place by *Colt 45*. *Fusee* was a couple of minutes behind and Mike and Cherri Taylor on *Maine Squeeze* 5<sup>th</sup>. The 18 mile course was challenging to all sailors who flew spinnakers and the winners average speed was 6.5 knots.

#### **VCORC** Random Leg

There were the traditional 3 races in the VCORC, sailed in perfect weather, with some interesting starts made by the race committee. The racing was tight in all classes and CIYC boats did well in Spinnaker A with Rod Abbott's *Funatic* just being piped by *XS* for 1<sup>st</sup> place, and our Dennis West coming in 3<sup>rd</sup>. 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
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
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
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
