


From the Quarterdeck





Boating Safety

Does your boat have a soundproducing device...? And can anyone hear it?

What is a 'sound-producing device', and why as a boater should I really care? Bob Dylan knew; "The answer, my friend, is blowin' in the wind. The answer is blowin' in the wind." (*Blowin' In The Wind*). And again, it may sound like a pun, but its not.

Without a properly operating sound device, like a whistle, a horn and/or a bell, your vessel, besides being out of compliance with federal regulations, is just not a well-founded vessel. In fact, without a properly operating sound device, you're placing you and your passengers in what could be grave danger.

The Requirements

According to the latest edition of the Navigation Rules (COMDTINST M16672.2D), all vessels greater than x feet are required to have a sound-producing device. Most recreational boats are required to have a whistle or horn capable of being heard ½ mile away (Rule 33.b and Annex III (C)).

In addition, the Rules (Rule 32) state that to qualify as a whistle, that the sound producing device be capable of providing the following signals: "(b) The term "short blast" means a blast of about one second's duration. (c) The term "prolonged blast" means a blast of from four to six seconds' duration."

Since most of the whistles and/or horns that are used in/on recreational boats are directional in nature, the Rules require these devices face forward on a boat, so the sound will carry and disperse in the general direction of the boat (most boats use astern propulsion very very sparingly).

Sound Signals

There are five basic sound signals a boater should know. I will briefly outline them. Should you require more information on sound signals and the Rules of the Road, the Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary recommend that you take an appropriate safe boating course. The Coast Guard Auxiliary provides several courses, which include this information, as well as our Boat Crew program for members of the Auxiliary.

Sound signals are broken into two types, long and short blasts. Short blast lasts for 1 to 3 seconds and a long blast from 4 to 6 seconds.

You will normally hear these sets of sound signals:

- 1 short blast and 2 short blasts which signify intent and acceptance in overtaking situations.
- Three (3) short blasts signifying a vessel in astern propulsion (as when a boat is backing out of a slip)
- Five (5) short blasts, which signifies danger or disagreement.

One long blast, which is meant as a warning that I am about to move from a position, which may be blind to you. You'll use/hear this signal when you're about to leave a slip (either in forward or astern propulsion), where the master of the vessel is blind to possible approaching traffic from the main waterway or as you are about to round a bend

approaching traffic from the main waterway or as you are about to round a bend in a waterway (like a river).

The Whys and Wherefore's

Why are sound signals important? On your car, you have both a horn and turn signals. With these signals, which generally can be seen during most hours of the day and night, you provide in advance, to the other drivers, your intent to turn.

Your turn signals tell the other drivers one of three things; your're turning right or left, or there is some sort of danger or hazard (when both sets of signals are on). On your vessel, navigation lights are in either the on position or off position. In addition, the ability to see navigation lights during the day is extremely limited. Thus, sound signals were devised to provide mariners with intent. This intent includes the ability to pass an individual vessel on either the port or starboard side.

Again, on your car you have a horn. Besides being used to vent your frustration with other drivers, the horn has some specific legal and safety uses. Included in these uses are to warn pedestrians and other vehicles to danger or dangerous situations, as well as to signify that your vehicle is exiting an area, where you the driver cannot see.

These uses exactly match the five short blasts, which is the danger signal, the three short blasts signifying astern propulsion and the one long blast signifying transiting an area where the master of the vessel is blind to possible approaching traffic.

Sound signals play an extremely important part in the safety of boaters. This is one of the reasons Vessel Examiners conducting a Coast Guard Auxiliary Vessel Safety Check will make sure your sound producing device works (as well as all your safety equipment).

To learn more about navigation, the rules of the road, or to request a Vessel Safety Checks you can contact the Coast Guard (http://www.uscg.mil/default.asp) or your local Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla (http://www.cgaux.org). A little more boating knowledge could just save the life of a loved one!

Coastal Knowledge . . .

Hello Boaters and Waterfront Lovers

WEATHER

Our weather is on track historically with the Multi-net medium to strong northwest-erly winds. I do believe this onshore condition will keep our local waters very uncomfortable for boating until mid July, when we start getting southwesterly conditions. Plan your boating from 180 degrees to 270 degrees. This will start your day going into the seas and following coming home. The best area to boat in the Channel Islands during northwest windy spring conditions will be the lee side or south side from Smugglers Cove to Bowen Point.

FISHING

Fishing has been slow in most areas due to the cold water that has stabilized throughout the Channel Islands. This will change slowly so one must look in the sheltered areas or lee sides of the islands to find water temperatures as close to 60 degrees as possible. Also fishing in shallow water under 20 feet deep will contribute to possible higher water temperatures from heat generated sun light.

We have in the past years fished primarily Calico Bass in the kelp beds using very light line, say 6 pound test and #6 nickel plated live bait hooks. This can be challenging due to the fact after hooking a Calico on light line, the fish charges for the kelp beds and wraps your line around kelp plants. To avoid pulling too hard, simply work your fish towards the boat using the rod high above your head and reeling

quickly. If the fish becomes firmly tangled in the kelp simply release the reel out of gear and slack the line until the fish attempts to swim signaling you with movement. At this moment put your reel back in gear and lift the rod's tip high with firm pressure and turn the reel hand fast. You may have to do this drill one to five times before your catch is landed.

Calico Bass are probably our most prolific fish in all the Channel Islands, I believe, because they have no legal commercial market demand. The size limit is 12 inches and up. I prefer to release fish over 3 pounds. This allows the larger mature fish to keep the population at a maximum for future sport fishing. If you are lucky enough to catch a few Calicos, you will need to keep them iced. I like to either keep them alive until filleting or clean, then ice whole to be filleted when I arrive at dock. Keep a measuring device on board. The Calico Bass size limit is 12" and enforced by park rangers and game wardens. Read the DFG rule and refer to their web site before each fishing trip.

Halibut fishing will start in May and June. I will be fishing in all the areas we have caught fish in recent years. The halibut will usually start the migration to the shallow waters to spawn in late April for summer's spawning. They start to build up in 80 to 100 feet of water and to the shallows. While they are a sandy bottom dweller they do like to be close to underwater rocky areas and between kelp plant to ambush feed. When I look for good signs I scan the waters for bait and watch the fish eat-



The Competitive Edge

Opening Day

Well the 2006 season no sooner seemed to end than we were looking at another Opening day. The festivities and ceremony will be covered in other parts of Currents, however I do want to mention that the RAM (Racing Associate Members) again pulled out all the stops and provided a first class repast for the members and guests. The ever popular RAM Hot Dog stand was a great hit, "selling" over 130 hot dogs in about 30 minutes. Well done to Kevin Dickmann, Rod Abbott, Larry and JoAnn Hansen and Paula and Richard Sharpe, not forgetting the leader of the Wiener Pack, Bill Brayton. All these RAM members also helped with the putting out and clearing away of the lawn furniture used for the opening ceremony. Each year the RAM members get to give a little back to the club, long may it be so.

CIYC Bob Cook Memorial Two Handed Race

One of the race series that separates the men from the boys (or women from girls) is our two handed series. Most people finish these races exhausted. The spinnaker boat especially have their work cut out for them. People generally don't have enough arms, legs and teeth to hold all the lines that need to be held.

The 1st 2007 Bob Cook Memorial race was sailed in flat seas with little wind to stress the short handed teams. The course around Gail and Gina is normally more challenging, but in the light airs some of the heavier boats suffered from lack of wind. First home in spinnaker class was *Bikini Machine*, an Olson 30, second was Deke Klatt, in a J24, the guy who just came 12th in the J24 worlds (yes, that's right worlds) and third by 1 second (yes that's right, 1 second) was CIYC's *Perfect Balance*. Dan Alpern has promised to attend speech therapy by the next race so when he is taking the finishing times he doesn't stutter over the name of my boat.

In the non spinnaker class the three boats involved were closely matched and all old adversaries. Winning out in the end was Steve Thompson of Ventura Sailing Club in *Runaway*, although his victory was not certain, as our Mike Taylor in *Harmony* was close on his heels, one minute and ten seconds later. *Valero* (Brent Swanson), obviously missing the duel between him and Kevin Dickmann (*Zuma Jay*) came in third, another five minutes later.

One of my favorite racing formats is the Pursuit Race where the slowest boats start first and the faster boats start at later times reflect-



ing their handicap. The Dick McCune Memorial Trophy is run in this format and on Saturday 7th of April, 17 boats were on the starting line at 11AM, the fastest on handicap having have to wait 55 minutes before crossing the line in pursuit of their slower competitors. The non spinnaker course went around Gina and returned to the harbor while the faster spinnaker boats circled Gail, Gina and the Hueneme Harbor buoy before turning for home.

Light winds up the track didn't bother the non spinnaker boats and they were able to free their sheets and drive straight for the 1st mark, but after the turn, progress back to the harbor was slow. The excitement built as the fleet returned to the harbor but *Vignette II* was not to be caught and she crossed the finish line after 2 hours 6 minutes. Our own Mike Taylor on *Harmony* picked up second place managing to hold off *Glyn de Mar*.

In the spinnaker class, light winds in the beginning favored the faster and longer boats. By the time the first 5 boats were around Gail the wind was down to 3 knots and the faster boats had caught up. The leaders at Gail were a J24, Coyote a J29, the two Olson 30's and *Rival*, a J35. By the Hueneme buoy they were all passed by *Deception* and *Funatic* as they used their high masts and long waterlines to devastating effect

Lady at the Helm

Our new race got off to a solid start on Saturday 14th April, just as we went to press.

Seven boats entered on a beautiful day for sailing. Light winds at first with the westerly building in the afternoon. The race committee with Dan Alpern again did a great job and the extended line meant that everybody was al-

lowed a trouble-free start.

The non spin class drew 4 boats, one of which, *Mystic Flyer*, an Islander 44, was crewed by nine women. First on handicap was *Zuma Jay* (Dorian Edwards, the youngest competitor on the course) followed by Connie Calo driving *12th Night*, then *Mystic Flyer* (Jane Thomas) and last but never, never least, Bobbi Lehman on *Dansuesse De Mer*. Close racing between all four boat, especially between *12th Night* and *Mystic Flyer*.

In the spinnaker class, *Funatic* skippered by Roxanne Vettesse, one of Rod Abbott's regular crew, led from start to finish, managing to break through the wind hold at the Gail oil rig. Following Funatic were Bikini Machine and Perfect Balance, two Olson 30's. This was much less of a procession with Bikini Machine, skippered by Christina Baum, taking the early lead only to be sat on by Funatic and forced to tack to the right. Perfect Balance decided the left-hand side of the course looked more favorable and indeed there was a 20 degree lift for the port tacker which left Bikini Machine on the outside of the wheel and losing her lead. The battle up the track was fierce and Tina Robertson on Perfect Balance gradually built a lead over the more experienced Baum, to be 75 yards ahead approaching the 1st mark. As the two boats sailed into the wind hole, it was Bikini Machine who rode her luck and came out the winner. Perfect Balance tried hard for the next 10 miles to overtake Bikini but it was not to be.

There were many winners out on the water but the greatest winners were our yacht club and the sport of sailboat racing. Well done all the ladies who made this a memorable day on the water.
